PREPARATION

25 The minister greets those who have gathered.

Grace and peace from the Lord be with you.

And also with you.

We gather today to lay to rest the body of our dear brother John Eric Polson, known and loved as *Jack*.

As we do so, we return to God a child of his own making and redeeming; a treasured husband of Anne; a loved father to Liz and Geoff, fabulous father in law to Paul and Joanne, and doting grandfather of Claire, Edward, Finn and Alex. As we do so, we also acknowledge Joanne's journey to Ireland, and pray for her safety and care as we gather here in Gisborne today.

In the tranquillity of this place, we allow God to sustain us as we surround Jack's family with love, and we pray that the Lord Jesus, through the gifting of the Holy Spirit will give to all his loved ones the comfort as promised in the Sermon on the Mount.

Now, we turn to scripture as we prepare ourselves for the committal.

One or more of these or other appropriate sentences from Scripture may be read.

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ!

By his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you.

1 Peter 1.3–4

For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep.

1 Thessalonians 4.14

A reading from the prophet Micah, chapter 6.

With what shall I come before the Lord,
and bow myself before God on high?
Shall I come before him with burnt-offerings,
with calves a year old?
Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams,
with tens of thousands of rivers of oil?
Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression,
the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?
He has told you, O mortal, what is good;
and what does the Lord require of you
but to do justice, and to love kindness,
and to walk humbly with your God?
Here ends the reading.

Today, as we gather, I would briefly like to reflect on that reading in terms of Jack's life. For me, I was not fortunate enough to have known him. In talking with Liz, on behalf of the family, I did ask her to prepare a few words before Geoff speaks, as to the qualities of her father.

As I listened, the reading from the Bible that became clear to me was from the prophet Micah. In context, the whole book is rather one of correction: it does admonish Israel for not following or living out their responsibilities as people of God. To contrast the call to follow God, through Micah, God gives us the example that he requires of all of us in living our lives out, fulfilling the potential of the perfect creation given to us as life.

As I listened, I heard the story of a wonderful husband and father who was a community minded man who lived out his beliefs, letting his actions speak loudly. His strong work ethic and respect garnered from his friends speak highly of the qualities of Jack's life.

Whilst I was not able to know this in Jack's life, I reflected on what I heard, and the reading seemed to be most appropriate.

We are not always required to be mindful and committed to the rituals and demands of human institutions, but in our lives but rather, we are asked to live a life that exemplifies the principles of justice, loving kindness and walking humbly with what God has given us.

Shortly, we will hear from Geoff, but I ask you to consider your relationship with Jack, in whatever capacity that may have been. Did he act justly and fairly? Did he show love of kindness in not only what he believed but in his actions towards others? Was he a person who humbly lived his life making a difference using the skills and values that he believed to be God-given?

These should all be rhetorical questions, but in what I heard, I think there may be an answer of yes to those questions. We all, due to our human nature, sometimes get things a little wrong, but today is about thanking God for all the good received from Jack and forgiving any indiscretion. We commit him in the name of the Lord Jesus, and pray that he is truly now at peace.

And as we leave here today, may we take inspiration from the words of the prophet and seek to do the same in our lives: do justice, love kindness and be humble as we continue our journey with God.

May Jack rest in peace and rise in glory.
